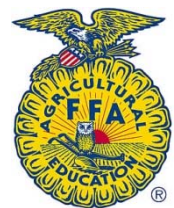

4-H GENERAL RULES

1. Members of 4-H Clubs in Fallon and Carter Counties are eligible to exhibit in this department. All members must be enrolled in the projects in which they are entering. All entries must be approved by the County Extension Agent or local club leaders.
2. All entries must be made on the Fallon County Fair entry blanks. Additional entry blanks are available at the Fair Office and the Extension Office.
3. Only one entry in each class per exhibitor except in rabbits and poultry when more than one type of breed is being exhibited.
4. No entry fee is required in this department.
5. Check fair schedule listed in County 4-H August newsletter for entry and exhibit-in-place deadlines for each specific project.
6. Attach "Age of Member, Year in Project", and year in current project level sticker to back of entry tags for exhibits in exhibit hall.
7. Exhibits need to be picked up at the Exhibit Hall between 6:00pm and 8:00pm on Sunday. 4-H members will not receive premium monies if they remove their exhibits from fairgrounds before Sunday at 6:00 p.m.
8. All 4-H exhibits will be judged on the Danish or Group System, of placing first group - blue, second - red, and third - white.
9. Posters must be no smaller than 14" X 22" and no larger than 22" X 28". Criteria for judging posters: Originality - 25% Neatness - 25% Content - 50%
10. Members who are enrolled in different levels of the same 4-H project are eligible to exhibit in the higher level only at fair time.
11. Entry forms must be turned into the Extension Office no later than Wednesday, August 4, 2010.
12. The Fallon/Carter Extension Service reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these 4-H rules and regulations and settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard to 4-H.

The point value equals \$1.00

4-H SILENT AUCTION

For Indoor Exhibits at the Fallon County Fair

1. Member must be enrolled in the project. Only one silent auction item per project, but member may enter one for each project they are enrolled in.
2. Item placed in the silent auction will be an entry in the fair. Item will be marked as such (for silent auction) on the fair entry form.
3. Silent auction item must have received a red or blue ribbon placing. If designated item does not receive a red or blue placing, another item may be selected from that member's other entries in that project that did receive said placing.
4. Member may require a minimum bid for their item.
5. Bids will be in increments of \$1.00
6. If the silent auction item is selected to go to Champion of Champions, a label will be on the item stating the situation to the bidders.
7. The location of the silent auction in the main exhibit hall will be at the discretion of the fairboard and manager; however, the location will be where the 4-H superintendents may observe the tables.
8. The auction will run from Saturday at 1:00 PM until Sunday at 3:00 PM. This will allow items to remain in their exhibit areas for a day following judging. A bright symbol placed on the entry tags of silent auction items will make it easier for location of items to place in the auction on Saturday.
9. At 3:00 PM on Sunday a Fallon County 4-H Leader will declare the bidding closed and announce the winning bidders for each item. Items are to be removed from the area by 5:30 PM Sunday. Payments will be made to the Fallon County 4-H Council and the treasurer will make out checks to the members. No deductions will be taken from the monies collected.
10. Items remaining after 5:30 PM on Sunday will be the responsibility of the member to deliver and collect money for. Likewise the checks will be made to the 4-H Council.

FALLON COUNTY 4-H & FFA LIVESTOCK RULES

1. Market Livestock ownership deadlines are:
Market Steers: February 1st
Market Sheep/Swine/Goats: June 1st
Market Poultry/Rabbits: July 1st
2. For the purpose of these rules; a 4-H project and an FFA SAE will be referred to as “project”.
3. If you are a member who is in both 4-H and FFA, you must choose at the time of the possession date which organization you wish to sell your animal under. Family alternate animals do not need to be designated 4-H or FFA. The member is only allowed to sell one market beef, one market swine, one market lamb, one market goat, one meat-type chicken and one rabbit.
4. To exhibit a market animal, the member must be enrolled in the appropriate market project. To exhibit a breeding animal, the member must be enrolled in the appropriate breeding project. The same animal, however, cannot be entered in both the market and breeding class at the fair.
5. The market animal classes are open to only Fallon County 4-H and FFA members.
6. The breeding animal classes are open to Fallon County and Carter County 4-H and FFA members.
7. 4-H and FFA livestock will be judged together.
8. Livestock Quality Assurance will be held at least twice a year to be attended by first year 4-H livestock projects members and again as a senior 4-H livestock member. 4-H and FFA members who wish to participate in Steer of Merit, must take the MQA program every other year.
9. All Market Animals must be weighed in. Weigh-in times will be Thursday evening to 9:00 p.m. A “bill of sale” must be turned in for market beef.
10. All stall and pens should be cleaned before 7:45 a.m. each day.
11. Judging will begin promptly at 8:00 a.m. on Wednesday, 9:00 a.m. on Thursday and 8:00 a.m. on Friday.
12. Only 4-H and FFA members will be permitted to care for, fit, show and sell their animals on exhibit unless good reason is presented to the Livestock Committee for the necessity of other arrangements. Leaders, family members and other current 4-H/FFA members may assist in fitting of exhibit animals.
13. Montana 4-H and FFA require that animals be handled in a proper and ethical manner in accordance with accepted modern-animal husbandry and scientific practices. In addition, adequate care, including watering, feeding and comfort should be appropriately provided to all animals. Any individual treating an animal in any other manner may be asked to leave the grounds.
14. Exhibitors, their parents, leaders and instructors have a serious responsibility to follow animal-health practices approved by the industry and the U.S. Department of Agriculture to assure that meat customers are receiving wholesome food. Health aids and other approved products should be used with care, according to prescribed practices, only when needed, and in correct amounts.
15. Montana 4-H and FFA require that market animals meet all the Food and Drug Administration regulations governing management and safety practices. Approved withdrawal times from health aids and growth stimulants must be followed. Animals that have not met these standards will not be allowed to be sold.
16. No 4-H or FFA Livestock animal is to be administered a tranquilizer in any form to show at the Fallon Co. Fair.
17. The following dress code will be followed for each 4-H livestock project except horse. A long sleeved white or solid colored shirt & dark brown, black or blue jeans, boots & western hat (or bareheaded); no caps allowed. The wearing of a tie or organizational scarf is preferred. White clothing is suggested for contestants in dairy projects. No tennis shoes or sandals will be allowed. Horse projects require a different dress code. FFA members

- must follow official FFA dress code. If dress code is not followed the contestant will be dropped a ribbon placing.
18. All 4-H and FFA members should be present 30 minutes prior to the livestock judging and the livestock sale.
 19. 4-H and FFA members should have their animals under control at all times at the fair. If this cannot be achieved, the Barn Superintendent has the authority to make other arrangements for the animal.
 20. Neck ropes are mandatory for all cattle not in an enclosed pen at the Fallon County Fair.
 21. Swine will be shown with a riding crop/bat/cane or pole only.
 22. All cattle must be halter broke by fair time & all members in these projects should know how to tie a bowline knot, in case of emergency so your animal can be released quickly.
 23. 4-H and FFA members must sell their livestock at the regular sale if they desire to offer them for sale at the fair.
 24. A base price will be set on market steers, sheep, goats and swine. Should a buyer choose to pay only what they have bid over the base price, the person/livestock yard setting the base price owns the animal.
 25. All market steers will be entered in one lot number. Grand Champion and Reserve Champion will advance to the Eastern Montana Fair in Miles City.
 26. The 4-H and FFA livestock will be sold in the following order:
 FIRST - Blue ribbon steers
 SECOND - Red ribbon steers
 THIRD - Blue ribbon hogs
 FOURTH - Red ribbon hogs
 FIFTH - Blue Ribbon lambs
 SIXTH - Red Ribbon lambs
 SEVENTH - Blue Ribbon goats
 EIGHTH - Red Ribbon goats
 NINTH - Blue Ribbon Poultry
 TENTH - Red Ribbon Poultry
 ELEVENTH - Blue Ribbon Rabbits
 TWELTH - Red Ribbon Rabbits

***Resale animals will be sold at the end of the Sale.**

***The Judge will determine sale order.**

27. Livestock sale advertisement, picture expenses, check-off expenses, ear tags etc... for market livestock will be taken out of the 4-H and FFA member's check before they receive it. This amount will be 2.0% of the gross amount the market animal(s) sold for.
28. The 4-H and FFA livestock sale will take place at approximately 4:30 p.m. immediately following the Saturday afternoon rodeo performance. The sale is held in the livestock pavilion. Signs will be posted in the building giving purchaser's name, sale price and approximate weight. Exhibitors will be solely responsible for the care and ownership of such livestock until they are dismissed to the owners at the close of the fair.
29. The superintendents have the authority to remove from the fairgrounds anyone publicly expressing disapproval of the judge's decision. Judge's decisions are final.
30. Persons with concerns about livestock projects should contact the Livestock Superintendents and then the Livestock Grievance Committee. The Livestock Grievance Committee may make decisions at the Fair in cases of unforeseen issues. Their decisions are final. This committee will be made up of the Ag Education teachers from Plevna and Baker, County Agent, 4-H Assistant and the Fallon County Livestock/Barn Superintendent.
31. All animals can be removed from the barns and fair at 3:00 p.m. Sunday. Exhibitors have until 6:00 p.m. to remove animals from the barn.
32. There will be one class for a Pen of Three in the Market Animal classes. This includes alternate animals (Market: sheep, beef or swine).
33. The last year a Fallon or Carter County 4-H and FFA member will be allowed to show and sell is immediately following their year of high school graduation.

ALL OUTDOOR ANIMAL PROJECTS - DEPARTMENT P

DIVISION 1 - BEEF

DIVISION 1A - Market Beef (Points 10, 5, 3)

- Only open to Fallon County 4-H and FFA members.
- This class is open to any beef breed or crossbreeds.
- Animals must have been owned and fed by the exhibitor since January 1st of the current year.
- No milk in any form shall have been fed to the animals 90 days prior to the showing.
- Every animal will receive a ribbon based on grade and yield at the discretion of the judge. White-ribbon animals shall be designated as unfinished and not salable as market animals.
- All animals shown must be halter-broke and shown in the ring.
- Carcass evaluation using Montana Steer of Merit measurements will be attempted on as many steers as possible depending on date and location of slaughter.
- The Grand Champion Market Beef animal and the Reserve Champion Market Beef animal are eligible to compete in the Champion of Champions contest at the Eastern Montana Fair.
- The dress code for showing beef cattle and breeding cattle is long-sleeved white or solid-colored shirt and dark brown, black or blue jeans, boots and western hat or bareheaded – no caps allowed. The wearing of a tie or organizational scarf is preferred.
- All Market Beef entries are required to have a Bill of Sale. The Bill of Sale must be turned in at the time of weighing the animal for the fair competition.
- Feeder or market beef status of beef entry will be determined at the time of weigh-in. Beef less than 900 pounds will be considered feeder beef.

CLASS NO.

1. Market Beef
2. Pen of three market beef: Individual, Family, or Club
3. Feeder beef born during the current year's calving season.

DIVISION 1B - Junior Stocker-Feeder Beef Calves (Points 6, 3, 1)

- Class open to members enrolled in the Junior Stocker-Feeder Beef project
- Entries are limited to steers and heifers
- Calves must be on fairgrounds by 1:00 p.m. Friday, and not leave until 6:00 p.m. Friday
- For additional rules, etc., refer to project guidelines

CLASS NO.

1. Stocker-Feeder Steers (born after February 1 of the current calendar year)
2. Stocker-Feeder Heifers (born after February 1 of the current calendar year)

DIVISION 1C - Beef Breeding Stock (Points 10, 5, 3)

- Beef-breeding animals must be in member's possession by June 1, of the current calendar year.
- All lots in each breed will enter the ring at once and be judged in the order of ages.
- Champion of each lot will remain in the ring for Best-of-Breed judging. Best of each breed will return for overall-female champion at the end of the judging.
- Beef dairy cows will qualify for Crossbred female.
- Only purebred animals can be entered as exhibits in Classes 1 – 16.
- Crossbred animals are exhibits in Classes 17 – 28.
- The top breeding yearling heifer in each breed is eligible for the overall Heifer Trophy.
- The top cow/calf pair in each breed is eligible for the over-all cow/calf trophy.
- A cow with an adopted calf may be shown, if the birth calf of project animal has died.
- PLEASE NOTE: There is no bull to be shown in 4-H unless shown as a calf when accompanying the mother in one of the above classes.

- A current vaccination record must be attached to the entry form or the cat will not be allowed to show.
- This class is open to all cats - mixed and pure breeds.
- Cats are not to stay on the fairgrounds. Cats are brought to the fairgrounds for the judging only, then removed.

DIVISION 4 – DOG

- A current vaccination record must be attached to entry form or dog will not be allowed to show
- Dogs are not to stay on the fairgrounds. Dogs are brought to the fairgrounds for the judging only, then removed.
- The conformation of the dog is not considered, but only the ability to present the dog to the judge.
- Dogs must be shown with proper lead and be groomed and clean.
- This Division is open to all 4-H Project Dogs - mixed and pure breeds.

DIVISION 4A - Dog Obedience (Points 8, 4, 2)

- All done on leash of 8 – 10 ft in length
- Level you exhibit in is based on ribbon placing of past performances of your dog and yourself working together as a team, not the level you are enrolled in. Your dog leader will inform you what level you are to exhibit in prior to the fair.

DIVISION 5 - GOATS

OVERALL GOAT GUIDELINES

- All goats must be clean and show ready. Members must fit or contribute to the fitting of their own animals.
- All exhibitors will adhere to the official 4-H and FFA dress code.
- A long sleeved white or solid colored shirt & dark brown, black or blue jeans, boots & western hat (or bareheaded); no caps allowed. No tennis shoes or thongs will be allowed.

- FFA members must follow official FFA dress code. If dress code is not followed the contestant will be dropped a ribbon placing.
- Members must have possession of their animals by June 1st.
- Collars are the only acceptable means under which goats may be shown.
- Animals must be shown in their respective classes before they are eligible to be shown in Dam & Daughter.
- Dam & Daughter class will consist of biological dam and daughter. The objective in this class is to show you have improved on the conformation of offspring.
- Any animal showing signs of disease, emaciation, warts, ringworm, abscess (caseous lymphadenitis) or other skin conditions or unsightly blemishes will be refused.
- All animals must be completely healed from disbudding or dehorning. No horned animals will be allowed to show with the exception of Fiber Goat breeds. Small scurs are not desirable but will be allowed.
- No males will be shown. No males of breeding age (over 2 months) will be allowed on the fairgrounds. If a male is castrated, they must be completely healed.

DIVISION 5B – Market Goats (Points 10,5,3)

- Market Goat guidelines in addition to Overall Goat Guidelines will be followed.
- This class is open to mixed or pure-bred goats born prior to June 1 of the current year.
- Members must have possession of animals by June 1.
- Males must be castrated and completely healed.
- Exhibitors must adhere to official 4-H or FFA dress code.
- Goat will be sold by the head and not by weight at the Market Sale.

DIVISION 5D – Pack Goat Project (Points 10,5,3)

- Class is open to doe or wether goats of any breed born prior to and in possession prior to June 1, of the current year. Wethers must be healed after castration.
- Exhibitors must adhere to the official 4-H or FFA dress code.
- A goat used in the obstacle course must be entered in a Dairy, Pygmy, Fiber, Meat, Harness, or Obstacle Course
- Lead and halter or collar are permitted. If led with collar and lead, collar will not be touched. Doing so will result in a loss of points.
- Course will be timed to help ascertain the winner.
- Course may include, but is not limited to: walking over several logs, a bridge, water obstacle, cones, and poles.

- Weight of packs and items not to exceed 25% of the weight of a “Well Conditioned” adult goat, and not to exceed 10% of the weight of a kid goat. Example: 10% of a kid goat weighing 35 lbs. by the current fair year is 3.5 Lbs. A well conditioned adult goat weighing 150 lbs. by July 15 of the current fair year can carry 37.50 lbs.
- All packs and goats must be weighed by goat leader by July 15 of the current fair year. Call in advance for appointment.
- Goat is to be led in and then stand while the packs or pack saddle is put on and loaded. A helper in this area is permissible. Then the goat will be lead around the course. Difficulty, of course, will be dependent on goat and handler maturity.

CLASS NO.

1. Goat competing for first or second year.
 2. Goat competing for third or fourth year.
 3. Goat competing for five years or more.
- *Goat competing for five years or more may show with voice command only if so wishes.*

DIVISION 5E – Obstacle Course (Points 8,4,2)

- This class is open to doe or wether goats.
- The goat being used for obstacle must also be entered in one of the other goat classes: Dairy Breeding, Fiber Breeding, Miniature Goat Breeding, Meat Breeding, Driving/harness, Market or Packing class.
- Exhibitor will adhere to official 4-H or FFA dress code.
- Goat is to be shown by lead and collar or halter and lead. Goat is to be led by lead only. If collar is touched, a loss in points will result.
- Novice Graduate members may show with voice command only, if so wishes, but goat must be under control at all times.
- Obstacles may include, but are not limited to: stairs, teeter-totter, log jump, barrel, and high jump.
- Time limit is set dependent upon the course and is set prior to the class by the judge and goat committee.
- All new goats will start as first year beginners.

CLASS NO.

1. Beginner – members competing in obstacle for the first and second year.
2. Novice – members competing in obstacle for the third and fourth year.
3. Novice Graduate – members competing in obstacle for the fifth year or more.

DIVISION 5F – Goat Driving/Harness (Points 10,5,3)

The harness goat project is a multi-year project.

The first year of the project, the exhibitor can take a kid in the harness kid class or first year.

The second year the animal can come back as a harness yearling. The third and succeeding years, the goat is in the senior harness class. The exhibitor must begin with the first year project. The harness goats will be judged on the following: the level of the class should deal with the level of the goat, not it's age.

- This class is open to doe or wether goats of all breeds, and in possession prior to June 1 of the current year.
- All goats must begin at First Year, regardless of age.
- Harness must not exceed 25% of adult goat weight.
- Advancement between the years must be approved by goat leaders for safety reasons.
- All equipment used on goats must be checked by leaders for safety, proper fit and cleanliness.
- If Pygmy Goats are being used, they must begin to be trained as a team beginning with first year.

- All carts, 2 wheel as well as 4 wheel are not to exceed 100 lbs. and must be in proper, clean and safe working order.
- Rider and goat must compete against any and all goats in their lot.
- Proper control must be maintained at all times.
- Once a member and goat has completed all before mentioned years and has passed assessments to the satisfaction of harness goat leaders, member may assess to drive a team of goats. Team must be reasonably matched in size and weight and compatibility.
- Assessments and weigh-ins must be arranged with goat leaders and completed by July 15 of the current year to participate in fair in each level.

JUDGING

Judging will be done on a point system with the following points:

1. Appearance of animal – 20 points
2. Appearance of exhibitor – 20 points
3. Overall appearance of cart and harness – 20 points
4. Performance of animal in show ring (following commands) – 40 points



DIVISION 6 - HORSES

FALLON COUNTY HORSE FAIR RULES

4-H and FFA Horse Classes will be judged on Wednesday beginning at 8:00 a.m.

1. All animals shown by 4-H members in 4-H classes must be owned by the member or in partnership with immediate family or the member must have access to the horse May 1 through the county fair.
2. Stallions may not be shown in any class with the only exception being a yearling in the Horse Training Project.
3. One horse can be shown by two members if in different classes.
4. The Best of Class in Horsemanship 1 & 2 at the Fallon County Fair would need to advance. Members in Horsemanship Levels 3-6 would need to advance after receiving 2 Best of Classes at the county level or 1 Grand Champion at the state level.
5. Members must compete in the most advanced level they are taking.
6. Horses may be shown two handed in a snaffle bit or hackamore. Horses shown in a curb bit must be shown one handed. A legal curb bit is any curb bit with solid or broken mouth piece. Mouth piece must be smooth where it comes in contact with horse's lips or bars, no protrusion below the mouth piece. Curb straps must be ½" wide and lay flat against the horse's chin.
7. Showmanship, Bareback Equitation and Trail are non-project classes and will be open to all horse project members at the Fair. To compete in these classes, the member must use a horse they have chosen to compete with in project classes at the fair.
8. Horses may be removed from the fairgrounds at 3:00 pm on Sunday.
9. Each 4-H Horsemanship Project member must identify their horses by May 1 of the current 4-H year. Records must be kept on all horses with ID's turned in. Identified Horsemanship horses will be eligible to be used by other 4-H Horsemanship members.
10. All horses in showmanship will be shown on halters only.

11. Horses will be housed in the stalls behind the bleachers of the Livestock Pavilion. Members are encouraged to decorate their stalls.
12. Horses must be exercised each morning and night.
13. Stalls must be cleaned by 7:45 a.m. each morning.

GENERAL DRESS CODE FOR ALL CLASSES

Western:

- Long sleeved, button or snap, plain white or off-white blouse or shirt (no contrasting colors can be present on the shirt)
- Western type pants
- Western boots and western type hat (felt or straw) or helmet
- Vests, sweaters and jackets are prohibited
- Chaps, gloves and ties are optional
- Spurs are optional unless otherwise prohibited
- Hair that is shoulder length or longer must be contained in a net or braid while showing in the project or showmanship classes

English:

- Hunt type - Hunt coat (red, pink or scarlet coats prohibited unless exhibitor has earned them as a member of a recognized hunt)
- Breeches
- Hunt boots
- Hard hat with leather-type-chin strap for hunter type classes
- Stock, chokers, or ties required
- Gloves optional
- Hair that is shoulder length or longer must be contained in a net or braid.
- Note: English jackets and/or vests may not be worn in halter, showmanship or bareback classes. Solid-colored long-sleeved blouse or shirt appropriate with English attire must be worn.

WESTERN JUDGING CRITERIA

Walk:

- Good - ground covering, flat footed, good attitude
- Minor faults - slow, disinterested, not attentive
- Major faults - nervous, jiggling
- Disqualification - not walking

Jog:

- Good - easy riding, good motion, consistent, steady
- Minor faults - too slow, too fast
- Major faults - not performing a two-beat jog, failing to jog both front and back, hard or rough riding
- Disqualification - constant breaking

Lope:

- (Cannot extend)
- Good - easy riding, good motion, consistent, steady
- Minor faults - too slow, too fast
- Major faults - wrong lead, pulling, trotting behind, hard or rough riding
- Disqualification - Not under control

Extended Jog:

- Good - easy riding, good motion, smooth, consistent
- Minor faults - inconsistent speed
- Major faults - breaking gaits, pulling, hard or rough riding
- Disqualification - no increase in speed

Back:

- Good - proper flexion, readily responsive, back in straight line
- Minor faults - hesitant, not backing straight
- Major faults - throwing head, gaping, pulling
- Disqualification - not backing, rearing

General:

- Good - smooth, steady, easy riding, proper flexion and balance, good attitude
- Minor faults - over or under flexion, sour ears, switching tail, inconsistent speed, out of balance, poll too high or too low to throw horse out of balance, improper or incomplete appointments
- Major faults - throwing head, bad mouth, constant bumping the bit, gaping, evidence of altered tail carriage, obvious schooling
- Disqualifications - constant breaking of gaits, two hands on reins unless using a snaffle bit or hackamore (bosal), kicking, illegal equipment, lameness, cuing horse in front of cinch, fall of horse or rider

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR RIDING CLASSES

Entries must be shown in a stock saddle. Tie-downs, martingales, and mechanical hackamores of any type are prohibited unless other-wise indicated in class description. Split or Romal reins are permissible, but roping reins are not allowed. Spurs are optional. Spurs should not be used forward of the cinch. In all classes, the judge has the option of requesting one or all contestants to perform individually.

Perform any tasks in Level I

Back your horse six steps, while mounted

Name the parts of the horse and/or tack

DIVISION 6G - Level VII

- The dam and offspring need to be biologically related.
- The dam and offspring need to be present for judging only. They may be returned home, not kept on the fairgrounds unless prior arrangements have made and approved of.
- The offspring would have been born on or after January 1st of the current year.
- Must be enrolled in the Horse Breeding Project to be eligible to compete in this class.

CLASS NO.

1. Dam and Offspring (The objective of this class is to show member has improved on the conformation of offspring.)

DIVISION 6I - Training a Colt to Maturity (Points 10, 5, 3)

Refer to Bulletin 353 "Training Horses -Yearling to 5 Year Old" for additional requirements.

Must be enrolled in the Colt to Maturity Project to be eligible to compete in this class.

CLASS NO.

1. Yearling

- Each club member will show his or her colt while standing at the walk, at the trot, backing and be able to pick up all four feet. Refer to Montana 4-H Showmanship Guide, Circular 1287. May be shown in Western or English attire and tack.

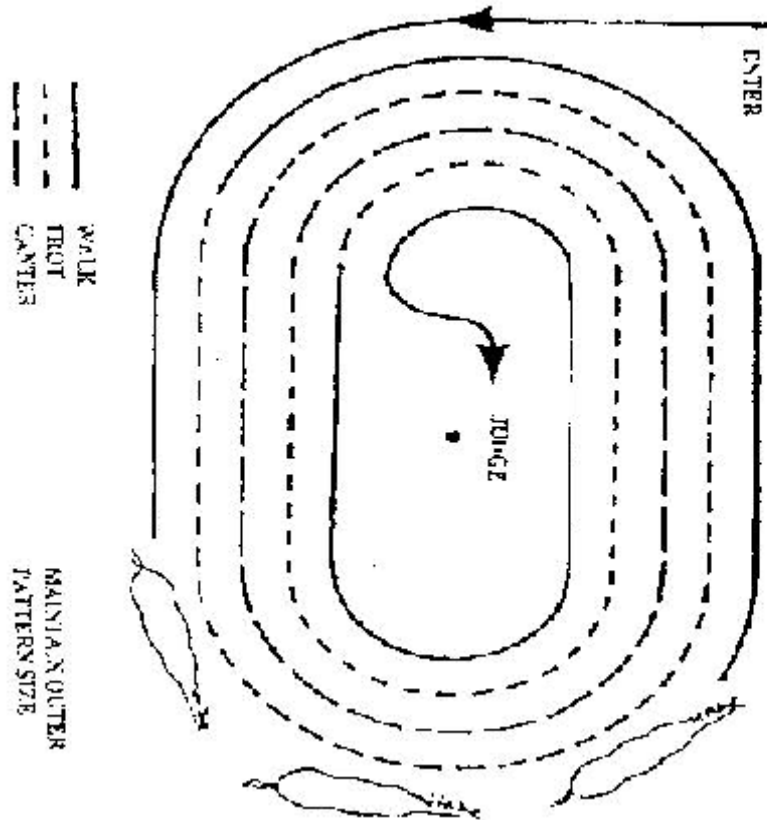

- For other equipment, refer to "General Requirements".
- Horses may be neck reined or direct reined. Either method is acceptable; no additional credit will be given for neck reining. Spurs should not be used forward of the cinch.
- Horses will be judged at the walk, jog, lope on the rail both directions and lengthen and reduce each gait as directed by the judge. Each individual will also be judged on Pattern #6.
- Other tasks the contestant may be asked to perform are:
 - Requirements from Class I and Class 2
 - Identify leads
 - Parts of animal, equipment and nutrition
- Judge is not to ask members to perform tasks not listed above or tasks not included in the pattern.

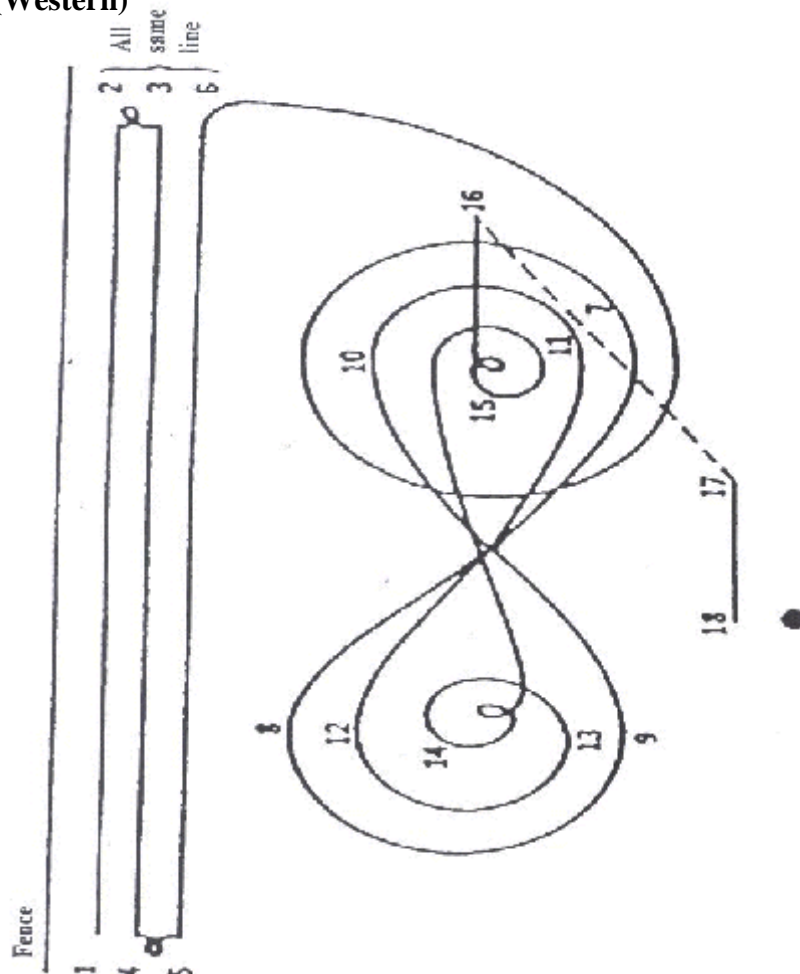

- Horses will be judged at the walk, jog, lope on the rail both directions and lengthen and reduce each gait as directed by the judge. Rider may post the extended trot, but must sit the jog trot. Each individual will also be judged on Pattern #7.
- Other tasks the contestant may be asked to perform are:
 - Requirements from Lots 2 and 3
 - Parts of the animal, equipment and nutrition
- Judge is not to ask members to perform tasks not listed above or tasks not included in the pattern

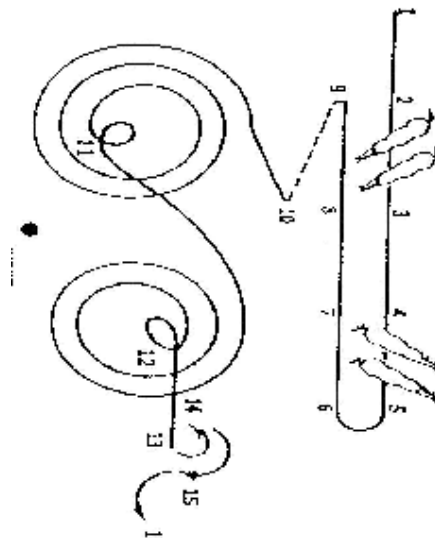

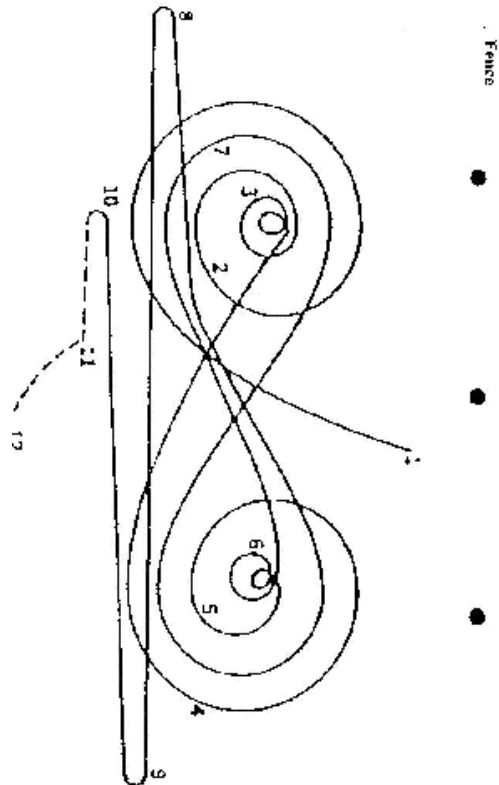

DIVISION 6J - Green Horse (Points 10, 5, 3)

This project is for members who have horses that are not fully trained, but do not fit into the Colt-to-Maturity Project because of age or ability. Open only to mares and geldings.

- Animal will show best with a ring snaffle bit or a rawhide hackamore (bosal). The use of running martingale or German Olympic martingale is permissible, but not mandatory. Other martingales, tie downs and bits are not permitted (shank bits are not permitted).
- Horses will be direct reined only (rein held in each hand).
- Horses will be judged on ability to perform **Pattern #5**.
- Other tasks the contestants may be asked to perform are:
 - Halt (not sliding stop)
 - Dismount and mount
 - Unsaddle and saddle up
 - Back while dismounted
 - Name parts of animal, equipment and nutrition

CLASS NO. 2 - Level II

- Animal will show best with a ring snaffle bit or a rawhide hackamore (bosal). The use of running martingale or German Olympic martingale is permissible, but not mandatory. Other martingales, tie downs and bits are not permitted (shank bits are not permitted).
- Horses may be neck reined or direct reined. Either method is acceptable; no additional credit will be given for neck reining. Spurs should not be used forward of the cinch.
- Horses will be judged on Pattern #6.
- Other tasks the contestant may be asked to perform are:
 - Requirements from Class No.1
 - Identify leads

CLASS NO. 3 - Level III

- Animal will show best with a ring snaffle bit or a rawhide hackamore (bosal). The use of running martingale or German Olympic martingale is permissible, but not mandatory. Other martingales, tie downs and bits are not permitted (shank bits are not permitted)
- Horses may be neck reined or direct reined. Either method is acceptable; no additional credit will be given for neck reining.
- Horses will be judged at the walk, jog, lope on the rail both directions and lengthen and reduce each gait as directed by the judge. Rider may post the extended trot, but must sit the jog trot.
- Horses will be judged on ability to perform Pattern #7.

CLASS NO. 4 - Level IV

- Horse will show in a curb bit. Skid boots are optional for sliding stop.
- Horse must be neck reined.
- Horse will be judged on ability to quietly and accurately perform Pattern #8.

General Requirements for English Horsemanship Classes

- The horse may be entered in English Horsemanship, but in only one class of English. (If a horse is also entered in Western Horsemanship, it can only be a maximum of two (2) levels different - higher or lower.)
- Dress Code: See General Rules. Entries must be shown hunt seat. Spurs and crop are optional.
- Snaffle bit or other suitable English bits - Smooth snaffle bit with broken mouthpiece (conventional 0-ring, egg butt, or D-ring) with ring no larger than 4" and no smaller than 2". From the cheek to one inch in from the cheek must be a minimum 3/8" diameter with a gradual decrease to the center of the snaffle. Optional loose curb strap (leather or nylon only and must be attached below the reins).

English Judging Criteria

Walk:

- Good - brisk, flat footed, good attitude
- Minor faults - slow, disinterested, not attentive
- Major faults - nervous, jiggling
- Disqualifications - not walking

Trot:

- Good - balanced, free moving, consistent, steady
- Minor faults - too slow, too fast
- Major faults - not performing a two-beat trot, failing to trot both front and back, hard or rough riding
- Disqualification - constant breaking

Canter:

- Good - smooth, unhurried, consistent, steady
- Minor faults - too slow, too fast
- Major faults - strong lead, pulling, trotting behind, hard or rough riding
- Disqualification - not under control

Extended Trot/Canter:

- Good - strong, ground covering, smooth, consistent
- Minor faults - inconsistent speed
- Major faults - breaking gaits, pulling, hard or rough riding, uncontrolled
- Disqualification - no increase in speed

Back:

- Good - proper flexion, readily responsive, back in straight line
- Minor faults - hesitant, not backing straight
- Major faults - throwing head, gaping, pulling
- Disqualification - not backing, rearing

General:

- Good - smooth, steady, proper flexion and balance, good attitude
- Minor faults - over and under flexion, sour ears, switching tail, inconsistent speed, out of balance, poll too high or too low to throw horse out of balance, improper or incomplete appointments
- Major faults - throwing head, bad mouth, constant bumping the bit, gaping, evidence of altered tail carriage, obvious schooling
- Disqualification - constant breaking of gaits, kicking, illegal equipment, lameness, cuing horse in front of cinch, fall of horse or rider

DIVISION 6K - Horsemanship: English (Points 10, 5, 3)

See Horsemanship Manual Circular 1160 for class requirements.

CLASS NO. 1 - English Horsemanship I.

- The horse will be judged at a walk and/or trot; post when trot. Riders may be asked to back, dismount and mount, unsaddle and saddle and name parts of bridle and saddle. Riders may be asked to explain but not execute correct diagonals.

CLASS NO. 2 - English Horsemanship II

- Horse judged at walk, trot, extended trot, and canter using proper diagonals. Riders must be able to identify correct leads, not perform them. Riders may be asked to perform any task in English 1, name external anatomy, and/or diagonals.

CLASS NO. 3 - English Horsemanship III

- May be asked to perform any task in English I or II
- Horse will be judged at a walk, trot and canter both ways of the ring using the correct lead. Posting trot and/or canter in a straight line around a pylon without breaking gait and return in a straight line. Back horse 10 steps while mounted.

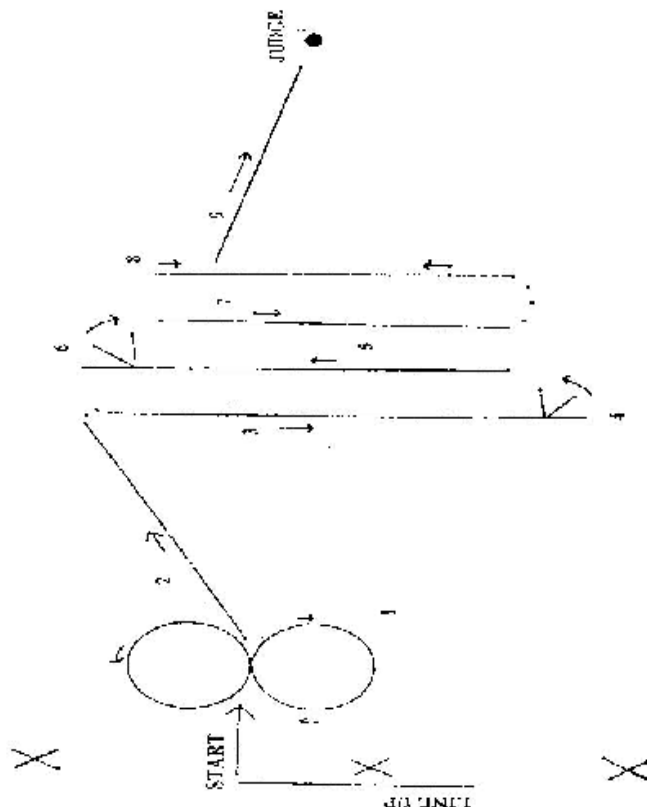

DIVISION 6O - Trail Classes (Points 8, 4, 2)

- The trail class will be judged separate from the other classes. Only 4-H members in Horse Projects may enter. This class will be judged on the performance of the horse in maneuvering the obstacles. The horse should work with a reasonably loose rein without undue restraint. The judge will have the right to ask for rail work.
- Six obstacles will be used, of which three will be mandatory and three others selected from an approved list. The distance between obstacles shall be at the discretion of the judge.
- Props may be changed due to availability.

CLASS NO.

1. Senior Division - 14 & over
2. Junior Division - 9 - 13 years
3. Yearling

Mandatory Obstacles:

- Opening, passing through and closing gate. (Use a gate which will not endanger horse or rider; gate constructed with a minimum of 50 in. from the top of the gate to the ground and a minimum width of 4 ft.)
- Ride over a wooden bridge. (Bridge should be of sturdy construction with a minimum width of 36 in. and with non-slip ramp approach.)
- Back through "L" shaped course at least 30 in. in width or back a triangle pattern through three oil drums.

Optional Obstacles:

- Ride over at least four (4) logs
- Water Hazard
- Walk over animal hide
- Walk over single pole (obstacles not more 24 in. high)
- Carry object from one part of arena to another (only objects which reasonably might be carried on a trail ride may be used)
- Put on and remove slicker
- Dismount and lead horse over obstacles not less than 12 in. high or over 18 in. in height
- Remove and replace material from mailbox
- Side pass

- Obstacle consisting of four logs or rails each 5 to 6 feet long, laid in a square
- Each contestant will enter the square by stepping over the log or rail at the designated side. When all four feet are inside the square, the rider will execute a 360° turn (right or left), pause and depart by stepping over the log or rail immediately opposite the side of the entry.
- Ground tying (dismount, walk about 10 to 15 feet and return and mount; also to be judged on dismounting and mounting)
- Rail work at the discretion of the judge
- NO bales of hay or straw will be used in a trail class because of the danger of catching feet or shoes in string or wire.
- NO tires will be used in trail class because of the danger of catching feet in tires.
- While horse is in motion, rider's hands shall be clear of horse to avoid cuing. Horses to be penalized by an unnecessary delay while approaching obstacle. Judges are encouraged to advance on to the next obstacle any horse taking excessive time at an obstacle.

7. A grand and reserve will be selected in both the Senior and Junior Division Round Robin contests as decided by the judges.

The Round Robin Showmanship competition will be held at 8:00 a.m. on Saturday of the fair in the livestock barn show arena.

1. Grand and Reserve Champion Showman selected in each of the following divisions will be eligible to advance to the Round Robin competition: (1) Beef Showmanship, (2) Horse Showmanship, (3) Dairy-Cattle Showmanship, (4) Non-Fiber Goat Showmanship, (5) Swine Showmanship, and (6) Sheep Showmanship

2. The animals shown by the Grand and Reserve showman in each division will also advance to the Round Robin competition.
3. Round Robin contest consists of Beef, Horse, Dairy cow, Non-Fiber Goat, Swine, and Sheep even if a grand or reserve champion is not awarded in each specie. If a specie did not qualify for Round Robin, superintendent will choose a suitable animal of that specie.
4. An overall Senior and Junior Division Grand Champion will be selected and awarded a special prize.

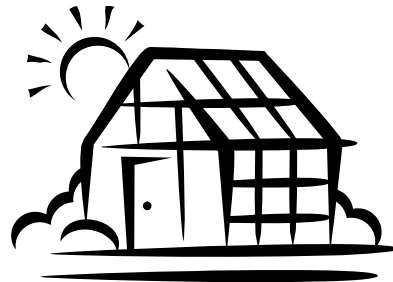
